Access all areas

In March this year tackle company Frenzee launched its Big Daddy pole pot which has the capacity to carry nearly a whole pint of bait, making it the largest on the market.

At the time the fish had not woken from their winter slumber and there was no need to pile in the bait, but now the fish have got their appetite back the Big Daddy pole cups will really come into their own.

It's not just the large capacity of the pots that makes them so great. They feature a lip which traps air between the cup and the water's surface which makes the pot float, no matter how much bait you put into it.

This enables you to float the pole pot to the desired position and allows you to access areas previously out of reach of a traditional-style pole pot. All you have to do is float the pole and pole pot on

the surface and then push it into position.

You can now get underneath overhanging branches or poke your way into tight marginal swims. Once you reach the desired spot, twist the pole and the pot empties like any other.

You can load the floating Big Daddy pole pot right up to the brim and there is still no risk of breaking your valuable pole sections.

Big Daddy Pole Pots will also come in handy when fishing at long lengths, particularly when you have awkward banks behind. You can float the pot on the waters surface while adding the extra sections, without fear of spillage on the way.

Tactics: Using the floating pot



1 FEED HEAVILY
The largest of the Big Daddy pots will take a huge quantity of bait, which is perfect for times when you need to feed heavily.



2 FLOAT IT
The cup floats, even when fully loaded. This allows you to float the pot on the surface while you add extra sections.



3 AWKWARD PLACES
Even at long lengths, the pot can be floated into position, allowing you to get the bait into even the tightest of holes. Simply twist the pole to deposit the bait where you want it.
